### Mr Scott-Evans writes:

It was an exciting evening on Tuesday as we hosted three meetings back to back to discuss our forthcoming residential trips. I am extremely proud of our teachers for their on-going commitment to these important events. I ran my first school residential trip in the first year of my teaching career. I look back now in amazement that my head teacher let me loose with such an undertaking! However, he knew what I know now: that the rewards are so great that the hard work is well worth it.

As society becomes more and more litigious and increasingly risk averse it is a real shame to see so many schools avoiding residential trips. With young people spending more and more time inside playing on computer games and watching YouTube, the need to take them out and to experience risk and adventure has probably never been higher.

Young people think that they are streetwise, but in fact they are often far from it. Many wonderful learning experiences take place in the classroom every day and of course you can learn a lot on-line, but there is really no substitute for the sort of learning you can do on a residential trip.

Students may feel they know their classmates and teachers already, but we always find that living together in a community brings a completely new dimension. It also allows opportunities for interdependence, leadership, teamwork and trust.

In my experience, time and time again, students surprise us on school trips. Those who sometimes struggle to shine in the classroom come to the fore when out of it. This then feeds back into the school when we return. New leaders are discovered and self-esteem is raised.

Meanwhile, students who perhaps normally excel have to find a new skillset outside of what normally works for them in the school setting.

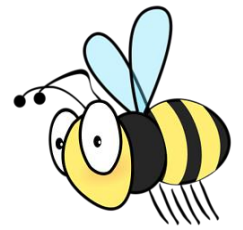

# Help needed!

## Bee Supportive - Bee on 'The Patch'



Are you willing to create a **buzz** at Becket Keys? Eco Club would like to invite you to join them on the vegetable patch on **Saturday 9th May** from **9.30am to midday**. We need your help to dig 6 further vegetable beds, a flower meadow strip and 4 areas for fruit trees.

Since winning the Secondary School Brentwood in Bloom category last July, the vegetable patch has been a key feature for green fingered members of Eco Club! The judges were very impressed by our students' horticultural knowledge and commitment to the project. This continued commitment and enthusiasm is shown through their ambitious plans to double the size of the allotment this year and incorporate fruit trees.



On the patch we are using organic farming methods and paying attention to the 3Rs (Reduce, Reuse and Recycle). For example, the supported mesh to protect young seedlings was made from some of the safety netting surrounding our school buildings during the replacement of windows! Last week, we made a herb spiral from old bricks. Next to our composter, a turf mound has started to take shape for squash. There are plans for a Coleoptera hotel and students are also looking forward to creating a Becket Keys scarecrow to protect our crops. Chef is already planning recipes in the Bistro to include our produce. The zucchini and chocolate cakes were very popular last year!

The theme for Brentwood in **Bee-loom** this year, as you might have already guessed, is **bee friendly** gardening. There is plenty of coverage in the media to heighten awareness of the need to protect bees. Our concern for the environment, biodiversity and developing the sustainability of the school, fits well with this theme. We are carefully incorporating plants perfect for pollinators into our designs. Brentwood in Bloom brightens up our borough and encourages everyone to work together. It is all about building community. Please do come along on the **9th May**. Bring a gardening spade and fork. Invite your family, friends and neighbours to help us too. We are finding the digging hard work and students are eager to get planting. If you have spare manure, vegetable and wild flower plants or seeds, these would also be welcomed.

Tea/coffee and homemade cake will be served mid morning in the beautiful sunshine (hopefully) to maintain energy levels. To ensure we have sufficient refreshments, please let us know the number of people in your group by **registering on the Parents' Evening System**. The event has been set up as 'Bee on the patch'.
