I think Strictly Come Dancing starts this weekend. How long will it be before they say that the celebrities will have to 'Face the Music'? This phrase, which seems to be unique to the English language, is something that I have been talking about in Collective Worship this week.

I have been asking students whether they are ready to 'face the music'. Each year group have their own challenges: Year 7 are settling into a new school, huge

Others are 'facing the music' in different ways. Selection for school teams, involvement in competitions and so on, all put pressure on our students.

During the times of worship, I have told students a story about how the phrase 'face the music' was once used. No one knows exactly where the phrase comes from, but I like this story. The story goes that a man forced his way into an orchestra using his wealth and influence. Without any ability on the flute, he was given the instrument and pretended to play! He bribed and bullied his way in, only to later be exposed when a new conductor



joined the orchestra and forced all the musicians to 'face the music' and play a solo piece.

He was a fake. He was exposed.

Many students fear that somehow, they are not good enough. They are concerned that as they start this new year and 'face the music' they will be exposed. With that in mind, I have read them our school Bible verse from the Gospel of St John: "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit fruit that will last—and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. This is my command: Love each other." Chapter 15v16-17 These words of Jesus have reassured us all this week that we are chosen and that we are going to be fruitful. It comforts us with the knowledge that we can ask God for his help. It gives us just one simple command: Love one another!

I have concluded our times of worship this week by drawing the students back once again to our seven Christian values: respect, responsibility, forgiveness, be caring, be fair, be honest, be trustworthy. These are the ways we can 'love one another'. They are also wonderfully inclusive and empowering. Everyone is good enough to live these out. It does not matter how clever you are, how much wealth you have or how handsome you are. There is also no limit to how much you do



them! Everyone can succeed to the *nth* degree!

Please take a moment to discuss with your sons and daughters this weekend the message of the collective worship, and reassure them that they are chosen, they will be fruitful, and that above all else they should focus on these Christian values.

My experience is that those students who focus on our seven values find that everything else also falls into place. Whatever their hopes and aspirations are for the year, they are much more likely to achieve them if they focus on these values. They have nothing to fear as they 'face the music' again this year.

A-Level & GCSE Exam Results

A level results day was a day of great celebration at Becket Keys Church of England School with over 120 students and almost 30 members of Becket Keys staff in school. There was all the usual excitement as results were given out and next steps were secured.

Mr Scott-Evans said, "It was an emotional day at the end of a very difficult journey for these students. I am incredibly proud of them all and have thoroughly enjoyed seeing them all today and hearing about the next steps of their educational journey. The grades, which are the best Becket Keys has ever achieved, are a firm recognition of how hard the students worked and applied themselves to their studies over the past two years."

As with last year's results, due to disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, the grades that students received did not come from end of year exams as would normally be the case. Grades have been awarded through a process of rigorous teacher assessment.

Good weather helped the process today as students, parents and staff were able to talk outside. Some students stayed on site with their friends until almost midday. Others were assisted quickly with University entrance before going off to celebrate their successes.

Mrs Downs (Chair of Governors) said, "It is really pleasing once again to see the overwhelming majority of students gaining their first-choice university - our highest number going to Russell Group Universities so far and another student off to Cambridge again this year."

In common with all schools in Brentwood, Becket Keys are not announcing our A level results. However, there are many students who have exceeded expectations and secured fantastic grades in their A level subjects. We are sharing some of their success stories here.



Face Coverings? Where do we stand?

Current guidance states that students are not required to wear face coverings in school. This will only come "into force" if an area is on a local lockdown. At Becket Keys, we are going above the guidance to ensure we are doing everything we can to reduce the possible transmission of COVID-19.

So, we are actively encouraging our students to wear masks in the following areas:

- Corridors
- Communal toilets
- Bistro/Orangery/Deli queue

The reason we are encouraging this is because our corridors are not well ventilated compared to our classrooms, this means "germs" can linger for longer. Wearing a face covering stops the transmission of saliva droplets given off by us when we

speak and breathe. We are also asking our students to be silent whilst inside buildings. This, coupled with the use of face coverings, will significantly reduce the spread of saliva droplets being dispersed.

So, please provide your son/daughter with a face covering (where possible in school colours: black, purple, gold, grey or white). If we all do our bit between lessons as well as following all of our other guidance, we can slow the spread of this virus that has significantly affected our lives so far and therefore keep our school open!

Ms Pogoda Head of Computer Science

I grew up on the shores of Lake Ontario in upstate New York, moving to England at age 22, the summer after I finished my first degree. I started my professional career as a computer journalist which was a good match for my BA English and my lifelong passion for technology. In 1995 I decided to make the move from writer to maker and enrolled on the MA Design for Interactive Media course at Middlesex University. From there I worked as a developer and designer with a focus on internet-based applications for a range of companies. In 1999 I was approached by staff at Middlesex about doing some part-time lecturing on the MA, and there discovered my passion for teaching. I found a full-time undergraduate teaching position in 2002, initially teaching IT/Multimedia/Programming,

before going on to write and then lead and teach two courses in computer games design and development.

When my son started school in 2012, I became interested in whether children could be taught coding (spoiler alert: yes they can!). I approached a local primary school about running a coding club. The next six years as a volunteer running coding clubs in both the infants and juniors raised even more important questions for me. The children in my clubs were refreshingly fearless learners and eager problem solvers. I found that some important qualities for success the children displayed, such as passion for experimentation and openness to learning from failure, were lacking in even some of my best undergraduates. How might these foundational skills be nurtured in secondary school? Another reflection was about gender. In the clubs I had always had an equal mix of girls and boys, equally interested and capable. However, this balance was not mirrored in my undergraduate classroom. I have always been aware of the disproportionate level of male to female students taking up computing or technology-based degrees and jobs. I became increasingly curious about why this is and how it might be addressed in secondary school.

For over 20 years there has been no doubt in my mind that I want to be in a classroom sharing my experience of, and passion for, coding and technology, to nurture the next generation of system designers, developers and engineers, but my work with the school children shifted the focus of my interest. So, after two decades of teaching in higher education, I decided to follow my curiosity and passion and applied to train as a secondary Computer Science teacher. I did my teacher training in Havering, and had settled into a job at St Martin's, when I saw my dream job advertised at Becket Keys building a Computer Science department from the ground up!

In my spare time, I am an avid reader (sci-fi and fantasy); attentive cat butler (Dora and Edmund); keen game player (digital and board); enthusiastic singer (wherever and whenever the spirit moves me). I am incredibly excited to be joining you all and very much looking forward to meeting and working with both staff and students as we embark on this exciting new journey to bring Computer Science to Becket Keys.

Next week, Year 7s will be making a couscous salad, please find the recipe below if you would like to try it at home.

Recipe of the Week Couscous salad

- 5og Couscous
- 100g Boiling Water
- Vegetables: peppers, spring onion, cherry tomatoes, cucumber
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon wine Vinegar
- Few drops lemon juice
- ¼ tsp salt and a few grinds of pepper
- Herbs 1 sprig fresh mint
 8 1 sprig fresh parsley plus
 ½ tsp dried mint
- 3og Feta Cheese crumbled

Method

Measure out the couscous into a container, pour over the boiling water, then place a lid or cling film on the container put to one side and leave it to soak.

Finely dice the pepper, cucumber and quarter the cherry tomatoes.

Finely shred the herbs and slice the spring onion.

Mix all the liquids in a bowl together. Once the couscous is cooked, (usually ten minutes) combine all ingredients together and sprinkle with feta cheese, serve and enjoy.

Sir Jack always says: 'If you think you can, you can!'

Instead of giving up, Sir Jack used the £39 he was given from the Navy to buy a secondhand car and started a taxi business. Through hard work, he proved them wrong and built a multimillion-pound empire. In 2016 Sir Jack received a knighthood in recognition of his years of charity work.




