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Mr Scott-Evans writes....

What kills fruitfulness (and teenagers)?

Last week I wrote about the strawberries I am growing in my garden; how fruitful they are and how my daughter collects them in the mornings. I made a comparison between my strawberries and the students at the school in terms of being fruitful and measuring fruitfulness. I mentioned at the end of my article that some of the strawberries are being eaten by pests and that this had made me think of what the equivalent was for our students. What stops them from being fruitful.

Those of you who have read my articles before may not be surprised to hear that my view is that fruitfulness comes from adherence to Christian values being imitators of God (Ephesians 5v1) and through the blessing of the Holy Spirit.

I believe that we all have an inbuilt desire to be fruitful and to seek God's leading in our lives. Even when we do not realise it! Our school's Bible verse says that Jesus chooses us, even if we do not choose him. It says he appoints us to be fruitful (John 15v16-17). In many ways: we cannot escape it!

However, if I had to put my finger on one thing that I would get rid of from all young people because I think it kills fruitfulness it would probably be the mobile phone. It is the biggest distraction from fruitfulness that I can see.

At worst, it even kills young people. Did you see the episode of Panorama this week? I

recommend it to every parent. It's titled: "A Social Media Murder". The opening lines and images are compelling. Scenes of a street that could be anywhere in Brentwood and a couple (parents) are speaking: "It is very social in this road. Everybody knows each other. It is a lovely place to live." The presenter explains that they live in the outskirts of Reading and have lived there for 19 years. They have two children. One Sunday afternoon, their 13-yearold son Olly left the house, grabbing his phone and saying he was going to meet a friend nearby. He said, "Don't worry I have my location on."

The last images of Olly were caught on a neighbour's doorbell camera. The evidence of what happened to him next was all found in the secret world of his (and other young peoples' phones). Olly's mother says: "It is a world where you can do and say what you want. It is a world that we had no idea existed. And that he was being attacked in it." The father says, "They hunted him. Tracked him through social media."

He then says: "It did nothing to protect him. And without it he'd still be here."

This horrendous case (which I can only appeal to you to watch on iPlayer) is a stark warning of the dark world we are allowing to attack our children. For many of you, this warning is coming too late, but for those who can still do



something about it: I would plead with you not to allow your child to have SnapChat. I would also be extremely cautious about WhatsApp (age limit 16), Instagram, TikTok, Facebook and Twitter.

If you do allow these things, please have strict limits on them and regularly sit with your child to see what is coming up on their feed. What a 13-year-old sees on their TikTok and Instagram is completely different to what a 47 year old head teacher sees!

The documentary includes a fascinating experiment where the presenter/journalist creates several fake accounts in the style of a 13-year-old to see what she sees. The content will be shocking to many parents. Having worked at Becket Keys for 10 years now, sadly I was not shocked. Most of the pain and problems that students suffer from, and we must respond to, seem to come from the mobile phone.

At the very best, the mobile phone is a huge distracting waste Page 2 of 20 of time which kills fruitfulness; at worst, it is leading to murder. There is a huge spectrum in between; very little of which is positive in my opinion. I am sure most of you will be reading this thinking that this article is for other families. I am pretty sure that is exactly what Olly's parents would have thought too.

For those of you not already doing it, it is possible to allow your child to have a smart phone and to use parental controls to limit what they can see and do on it. There are plenty of articles and videos about how to do this online. Like <u>this help sheet</u> from Apple and <u>this video</u> from TechBoomers.

Before we get too high and mighty about phone usage, I think that we need to get our own house in order as parents and teachers. Next week, I will take a look at our use of our phones and what sort of example we are setting!

Book of the Month - June



A new fast-paced thriller about two sisters vying for the top spot on their cross-country team—until a teammate's disappearance throws their lives off course. Stella and Ellie Steckler are only a year apart, but their different personalities make their relationship complicated. Stella is single-minded, driven, and she keeps to herself. Cross-country running is her life and she won't let anything get in the way of being the best. Her sister Ellie is a talented runner too, but she also lets herself have fun. She has friends. She goes to parties. She has a life off the course. The sisters do have one thing in common, though: the new girl, Mila Keene. Both Stecklers' lives are upended when Mila comes to town. At first, Ellie and Stella view the new star athlete as a threat. But soon Ellie can't help but be drawn to her warm, charming personality. After her best friend moved away and her first boyfriend betrayed her, Ellie's been looking for a friend to share her secrets. Stella finds herself noticing the ways she and Mila are similar. Mila is smart and strong-she's someone Stella can finally connect with. As the two get closer, Stella becomes something she vowed she'd never be: distracted. With regionals approaching and college scouts taking notice, the pressure is on. Each girl has their future on the line and they won't let friendships get in their way. But then, suddenly, Mila goes out on a training run and never returns. No one knows what happened, but all eyes are on the Steckler sisters.

This novel is also a thoughtful examination of socio-economic challenges, the impact of crushing personal secrets, and the ways female athletes suffer under the weight of misogyny, especially when they are aggressively competitive.



ARE YOU LISTENING?



Take a few moments to quieten yourself. Breathe slowly and deeply and become aware of God's present in this moment with you.

Matthew 13:7–9





"Some seed fell among the thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it. But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

In the parable of the sower, Jesus tells his listeners that in the act of scattering seed, some seed fell on unsuitable soil and withered. But the seed that fell on rich soil grew and produced an abundance of fruit. God's Word, heard by those willing to accept it, will also bear an abundance of fruit. Christians are called to be faithful to the task of proclaiming the truth of God's Word, to have faith that those words will find rich soil and produce abundant fruit.

What kind of soil would you use to describe you spiritual life at this time?

What message does God's Word have for you today?

In prayer, we experience God's love. In our response, we humbly return that love. And, if we have ears to hear, God always pushes us to go deeper. Jesus' life shows us that prayer always extends to our neighbour; it pushes us to notice the divine spark in all of God's children, to show love without reservation. It is this love that bears much fruit for the Kingdom.

Speak to Jesus, using this prayer or a prayer of your own and listen:

Jesus, you are the master farmer. Help me to follow your example of planting with grace, confidence, and love. Help me to have a listening ear and to hear all that You have to say to me. Give me a teachable spirit and let me grow in a knowledge of You. Help me to

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trust implicitly Your Word for Your Word is truth, in Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

During the week ahead, set aside a little extra time to pray and read the Bible. God sent His only begotten Son into the world and He expects us to listen to Him. God speaks to us through His Word; His living Word (the Lord Jesus Christ) and His written Word (the Holy Scriptures). God has called us to 'hear Him', because faith comes by listening and hearing from the Word of God. In the scripture, on numerous occasions, we are strongly advised: he who hath ears to hear, let him hear!







The first fixture for the combined Year 7 and 8 cricket team saw us take on Brentwood School. Captain Zach Ellis and Vice-Captain Liam Adams took immediate control of the team and set up the warmup, which set the tone for the match. Like with anything, preparation is key!

Zach won the toss and confidently elected for the team to bowl first, as he wanted to chase down a target when batting. Liam opened the bowling and on just his second ball, took the first wicket before finishing the over somewhat frustrated. This was due to the Brentwood batsman scoring two boundaries at the end of the over. Cody Hyam was up next and after four very consistent bowls he found the line and length and took the other opener. Cody then bowled the next batsman for a golden duck!

Up next was Nick Moses, whose natural power was combined with accuracy as his fast bowling terrified the batters! It very quickly resulted in a panicked run out, as Cody directly hit the stumps from a near impossible angle! This momentum then allowed Nick to bowl the middle stump out to claim his second wicket. Up next was Alex Kerry, who also managed to claim two incredibly bowled wickets with his unorthodox short runup! The fifth bowler was James Gemmill, whose rollercoaster over consisted of wides, no balls, dots, runs and most importantly the eventual wicket with an LBW.
