Senior Prefect Team 2023-24

At the end of last term, the interview process for our new Senior Prefect team took place. This group consists of a Head Girl, a Head Boy and four Deputies, and they will be prominent figures at Becket Keys over the next year as they organise events, coordinate Prefects, speak at functions, welcome visitors and much more.

All Year 12 Prefects were invited to apply by submitting a formal letter of application. Mrs Course (Deputy Head of Sixth Form), the current Senior Prefect team and I then considered these

applications and the contributions the students had made to the school during their time in Year 12, both as Prefects and in other ways. Eleven students were shortlisted, and they then had three further opportunities to show their suitability for the roles. Firstly, they made a four-minute formal speech in front of a group of teachers, support staff and students. They were then interviewed by two different panels, with the first consisting of Mrs Downs (Chair of Governors) and me and the second made up of Mr Scott-Evans and Mrs Course.

experiences at Becket Keys and explain their visions with such enthusiasm and commitment. 

English Department- Recommended Reads - Crime


This month the Year 7s have been reading 'Lies Like Poison' in form time. This is a crime novel that tells the story of a woman who is poisoned, and the girl who claims to be framed for the murder! If you enjoy this genre, here are some of my recommended reads!




The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time is a murder mystery novel like no other.

The detective, and narrator, is Christopher Boone. Christopher is fifteen and has Asperger's Syndrome. He knows a very great deal about maths and very little about human beings. He loves lists, patterns and the truth. He hates the colours yellow and brown and being touched. He has never gone further than the end of the road on his own, but when he finds a neighbour's dog murdered he sets out on a terrifying journey which will turn his whole world upside down.

The case is closed. Five years ago, schoolgirl Andie Bell was murdered by Sal Singh. The police know he did it. Everyone in town knows he did it. But having grown up in the same small town that was consumed by the crime, Pippa Fitz-Amobi isn't so sure. When she chooses the case as the topic for her final project, she starts to uncover secrets that someone in town desperately wants to stay hidden. And if the real killer is still out there, how far will they go to keep Pip from the truth . . .






At Deepdean School for Girls, Daisy Wells and Hazel Wong have set up their own detective agency. But they are struggling to find any real crimes to investigate. (Unless you count the case of Lavinia's missing tie. Which they don't.)

Then Hazel discovers the Science Mistress, Miss Bell, lying dead in the Gym. To add to the mystery, when she and Daisy return five minutes later, the body has disappeared. Now Hazel and Daisy not only have a murder to solve: they have to prove one happened in the first place.


Determined to get to the bottom of the crime before the killer strikes again Hazel and Daisy must hunt for evidence, spy on their suspects and use all the cunning and intuition they can muster. But will they succeed? And can their friendship stand the test?

This month the Year 8s have been reading 'One of Us is Lying' in form time. This is a crime novel that tells the story of 4 teenagers trying to clear their name after a classmate dies in the same room as them! If you enjoy this genre, here are some of my recommended reads!



Cadence Sinclair Easton comes from an old-money family, headed by a patriarch who owns a private island off of Cape Cod. Each summer, the extended family gathers at the various houses on the island, and Cadence, her cousins Johnny and Mirren, and friend Gat (the four "Liars"), have been inseparable since age eight. During their fifteenth summer however, Cadence suffers a mysterious accident. She spends the next two years—and the course of the book—in a haze of amnesia, debilitating migraines, and painkillers, trying to piece together just what happened.

Tell the truth. Or face the consequences. One year ago, there was a party. At the party, someone died. Five teens all played a part and up until now, no one has told the truth. But tonight, the five survivors arrive at an isolated mansion in the hills, expecting to compete in a contest with a \$50,000 grand prize. But of course... some things are too good to be true. They realize they've been lured together by a revenge seeker who wants to unravel the truth about what actually happened that deadly night, one year ago. Five arrived, but not all can leave. Will the truth set them free? Or will their lies destroy them all?





I'll make it clear from the start: I did not kill Hugh Henry Van Boren. I didn't even help. Well, not intentionally.'

When Hugh Henry Van Boren, one of the most popular and richest kids in Jess Choudhary's school, is found dead, the student body is left reeling and wondering who the murderer could be... Jess, a student under strict instructions to keep her record clean or risk losing her scholarship, finds herself at the centre of the investigation when it's revealed that Hugh died in the exact same way as a character in a short story she wrote. And then Jess receives an anonymous text thanking her for the inspiration. With time running out, Jess knows if she doesn't solve this mystery she'll finally have something in common with Hugh Henry. She'll be dead too.





Jesus Appears to His Disciples

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were



locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

(John 20:1-29)

This is an account of one of Christ's appearances to the disciples after the Resurrection. Thomas doubted no longer! He went out to preach the Christian message of love and forgiveness. In interpreting this passage, many have said Thomas did not doubt that the disciples had seen something, but he could not grasp the reality of their experience. Jesus could have left

Thomas struggling to believe, but, in His great love, for Thomas and humanity, He merely says, 'Do not disbelieve, but believe'.

What message does this have for us today? In this world, we will face many challenges. These can so easily pose a threat to our faith and our relationship with God. I wonder what St. Thomas would say to us? Maybe he would tell his story of how Jesus' life had intercepted his own. Maybe he would tell us of his fears and hesitations to believe, but would then recount his joy of seeing and knowing the risen Jesus himself. Maybe he would tell us to have faith. In fact, this turns the story into one about gratitude replacing fear and thanksgiving replacing grief, not a story about doubt at all.

Be reassured that no one has perfect faith and, in fact, our doubts can lead to stronger faith. Doubt gives room for faith to grow. Sometimes we simply want

all the answers before we commit to something. While God has revealed so much to us, we may never fully understand the Trinity or how God created everything out of nothing, but we can comprehend enough for us to rest in God when mystery arises. Paul told the Corinthians that he brought to them things 'of first importance' (1 Corinthians 15:3). He went on to speak about the death and resurrection of Christ as the central truth of our faith. This can never be outweighed by doubt.

Faith cannot block out darkness or doubt. When on the cross, Jesus did not cry out "Here I come!" but "My God, why have you forsaken me?" We have also seen that His disciples brimmed with doubts and misgivings. However, just as courage is persisting in the face of fear, so faith is persisting in the presence of doubt. Doubt is therefore not just a vulnerability; it can also be seen as a strength. Doubt acknowledges our own limitations and confirms or challenges fundamental beliefs. Doubt can, therefore, be seen as a crucial part of faith, rather than something which detracts from it.

Doubt is not lack of belief. Therefore, we must live according to the little faith we have, not turn away from it. Instead of turning away when things are tough, we must pray, face God and rest awhile in His loving arms. He will embrace us in compassion, accepting us as we are and in so doing, deepen our faith, regardless of our doubts

and insecurities. He will drive out fear, replacing it with courage and hope.

Let us pray:

Our Lord and God, help us draw closer to You. Strengthen our faith in the knowledge that You are with us always as the the truth and the life. Amen.









The boys were in high spirits in the build up to this fixture and a combination of nerves and excitement were evident. In the last game we were losing 1-4 trail and came back to to win 5-4, so I too was confident that the boys had the mentality needed to win silverware. We arrived promptly and a thorough warm-up began. The formation was 532 when defending and 352 when attacking which had been the tactics to get us to the final so we trusted the system. Will started in goal with the back 5 consisting of Callum E, Joe G, Sam B, Sam C and Levi. Holding was Jack and Henry W © with Emeka pushing forwards. Up top we used the trusted Callum G and Harry A. My bench was strong with Joe T, Jacob, Sam T, Folarin and Brendan.

We started well considering we were playing into a strong wind. The Anglo side had two powerful and quick forwards who caused problems and Callum E was holding his own with Sam C supporting on the left side. The game was on a knife edge as both sides were hesitant because the speed each team had. The risk of counter attack was always going to be dangerous and exactly that happened as some attacking play from the right hand side broke down and the Anglo pair were able to link up and score; we found ourselves trailing. We fought back with Harry A and Emeka linking up to pass to Callum G whose powerful strike forced a great save from a very strong Anglo keeper. The half was dying out and the conditions made it hard to get an



attack flowing but there was one last push where Emeka used his quick feet to 'buy' a foul; he felt contact and went down. Henry W was able to convert the penalty. HT 1-1.

The second half we knew the conditions would now favour us and it would be hard for Anglo to play their long ball game. One change at half time was Jacob (on for the solid Jack) to offer slightly more attacking options. Callum E was replaced by Joe T on the left side. The boys started to create more with Joe T driving forwards with the ball and causing problems. In a similar way to the first half, we committed too many forward and the Anglo strike force linked up superbly squaring the ball to tap into an empty net. We trailed again. This was clawed back instantly as an outrageous reverse pass from Joe T found the run of Callum G who rounded the keeper and when it looked like the ball had got stick under his feet, he was able to dig out a shot between the two well positioned defenders on

the line and ignite the charge. Harry was throwing himself about up top and slid a ball into Callum G who had a low chance to win the game but for the second time the Anglo keeper was able to palm away.

Extra time was needed to separate the two sides and Anglo found themselves through on goal. A slightly heavy touch gave an opening for Will to come out bravely and smother at the strikers' feet and he suffered a knock in doing so. True 'body on the line' keeping from someone who refused to lose this game! Sam B also managed to clear one off the line and the sound of penalties was almost a sigh of relief.

I spoke to Will who had an unbelievable game.

I gave him my advice: right footed players will shoot right and left footed players will shoot left. Not overly scientific but it eliminated the guesswork.

Anglo took first and the right footer stepped up and opened his body to slot the ball... straight into the hands of Will who dived correctly giving us the upper hand. Our first taker was Henry W who had already converted from the spot and the keeper dived the right way, but he slotted it home. After Anglo scored their goal Callum G stepped up and blasted his penalty powerfully into top corner. After another successful penalty, Sam Boreham stepped up and drove his penalty high into the roof of the net. The left footed Anglo player saw Will making the goal look small and skied his penalty over the bar giving Emeka the chance to win the game and he calmly slotted the penalty home! My MOM for the game goes to Will Charters for his safe hands!

Personally, I could not have been happier for this group of boys. Their development over their time at Becket Keys has been incredible and seeing this super sixteen go on to win the MESSA Cup was a treat I shall never forget. All involved played their part and fully deserved this win. I wish you all the best with your footballing journeys into the male adult game, whether it's competitive Saturdays or Sundays for enjoyment. Keep at it!
