# Why Does Oracy Matter?

I have been telling students this week in Collective Worship an anecdote from my summer holiday. Sitting in a beautiful Greek taverna, waves gently lapping the shore, sun setting over the sea, I was enjoying talking to my family about the day and soaking up the atmosphere. The family at the next table were notably quiet. I

glanced over to see two young children, headphones clamped to head and noses engrossed in tablets. Both parents were scrolling through their phones. It saddened me to observe that they barely spoke a word to each other throughout the meal.

I have real concerns that we are losing the art of articulation, conversation and debate. Spoken language skills are one of the strongest predictors of a child's future life chances. Happily, there are some simple things that you can do at home to help with oracy skills.

Reading helps with spoken language skills by providing an improved vocabulary. Encourage reading at home as much as possible. Watching Ted talks

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together, watching BBC Question Time or anything which demonstrates strong speaking skills, then discussing the issues together (possibly over dinner!) is a great start. Give your son or daughter feedback by letting him or her know if he or she articulating clearly and audibly in full sentences, is avoiding using filler words (er, um, like...) and is speaking using correct grammar.

We provide lots of opportunities in school for students to improve their oracy skills – class discussions, group work and giving presentations or speeches to name a few. I would urge students to use the safe space of school to take part in class discussions and to practise speaking aloud as much as possible to improve and gain in confidence.

#### **Student Council**

Following on from the message from Mr Scott-Evans in the last newsletter, Kitty Anderson who is in Year 9 and a member of the school council wrote with some ideas about making the school more eco-friendly.

Dear Mr Scott Evans,

I am writing to you about my Earthshot ideas to help our school become more eco-friendly. Recently in Collective Worship you were telling us about lots of animals, including peacocks and hedgehogs, reinhabiting our school since the coronation gardens have been put in place. I have a passion for animals and as a proud vegetarian and animal lover, and it got me thinking about how we can attract even more living creatures into our school and would make it an enjoyable place for creatures from peacocks and hedgehogs, to birds and bugs to bats and squirrels and so many more! I think that we could create more homes and food sources for these creatures, such as having bird feeders and bug houses dotted around the school. We could also have lots of bird houses, hedgehog homes and even bat hideouts. I was also thinking we could even build these ideas into our DT curriculum, by building our animal hideouts and learning about their habitats as we go along. By simply adding small changes like this we, as a school, could attract so much more wildlife to protect and restore the nature in our area.



Another thing that I have noticed since I've joined the school is how much printing is done, especially in the science department. There are so many sheets to stick in when we could easily write it straight into our exercise books. It is vital to be saving paper and by printing less in each subject, costs would down drastically.

I have one more big idea for our school. We could as a school be one of the first schools to go completely vegetarian! By doing this, we could cut costs, aid our environment and serve healthier food. We could add compost bins. If we couldn't go completely vegetarian, we could serve vegetarian food three times a week. We would take inspiration from the world's first vegan football club: The Forest Green Rovers. I am sure that they were told that they couldn't do it, but they did anyway and we should all take inspiration from them!

There are so many more things we could do such as: gifting each Year 7 student with a reusable water
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bottle, rewards for students who walk to school (or who walk part of the way), drink can bins, solar panels, using local suppliers to reduce CO2 emissions and so much more.

The topic of creating an ecofriendly school could be discussed more in council meetings, worship and assemblies.

I hope you will take some of my ideas into consideration.

#### Remembrance Day Memorial Service Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November 2023


We would like to invite all parents and carers to our memorial service for Remembrance Day on Friday 10th November 2023

It will begin at 10:45am and will finish at approximately 11:05am.









#### Our School Library (Lib A)

As parents it is important to look at your son/daughter's phone regularly. You should know what apps they have and what they are used for. The activity on all phones is often being tracked. As adults this is a concern, for your children it is a significant safeguarding risk.






