BISHOP ADAM THE NEW BISHOP OF BRADWELL

Mr Scott-Evans writes.....

Dear Parents,

We were delighted to welcome the new Bishop of Bradwell to Becket Keys yesterday. Bishop Adam Atkinson came with Father Andy Smith to meet students, lead a time of collective worship and to bless a new stoup in the John Wraw chapel.

Bishop Adam and Father Andy led a time of collective worship with Year 8 in the main hall. Picking up on the themes of Advent that had already been the focus of our Eucharists, Bishop Adam spoke about the peace of Christ. He told us of a time when he had been serving in the army and had thought he had lost one of his troops whilst on a late-night manoeuvre. He compared the peace he felt knowing the solider

was safe with the peace that Christ can bring to our hearts. The missing soldier being found completed Bishop Adam's troop; Christ completes not only Christmas but brings a peace for our whole lives.

Bishop Adam then joined Father Andy and me in my study for a drink and cake with a few selected students. He asked them guestions about how the church may be able to support them in school. They asked him for his prayers. The students also asked Bishop Adam about his job, whether he was ever in touch with King Charles, whether he liked his work and whether he had always wanted to be a priest. Bishop Adam explained that he was not a senior Bishop and so was not at the House of Lords. He

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said he had never met King Charles, but he said that Bishop Guli had done and that she had recently been to Sandringham.

Bishop Adam then kindly went to the John Wraw chapel where he blessed a brass stoup that I had recently purchased for the school. He took a moment to gather some Sixth Formers and he prayed for them and the other students at the school asking God for the stoup and the chapel to help draw us closer to God in our worship. We prayed that the stoup would remind us of our baptism every time we use it.

During a wider tour around the school, Bishop Adam visited our art, textiles, drama and music departments. He also saw Sixth Formers, mathematics and humanities. He finished his tour in modern foreign languages. Bishop Adam was particularly keen to see how our more vulnerable students were being catered for. He was delighted to meet our SENDCo, Mrs Dowsett and eager to see that SEND students were all in their lessons learning rather than being taught separately. He was keen to hear that we do not have an 'inclusion room' or a 'student support centre' agreeing that instead students' needs are better met with their peers in classes. Bishop Adam was also pleased to hear that all teachers are trained in meeting the needs of students with SEND and that the school does not use Teaching Assistants.





I presented Bishop Adam with a few gifts before he left. There was a card designed and handmade by Naomi Sibbald, some chocolate brownies made by Layla Macdonald and an enamel badge. Before leaving, Bishop Adam prayed again for the school saying that he would look to return again soon.

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It was a very encouraging morning, and I am grateful to Bishop Adam for coming and to Father Andy for organising things.

Computer Science Department

Year 12 Computer Science students ChriSTEMas Event at BT

On December 7th the Year 12 Computer Science students had an exciting trip to the BT R&D Headquarters at Adastral park to learn more about what life will be like for future computer scientists and how AI would affect the way we work.

We started off with an informative talk on the future of AI and how many software engineers would have been able to use AI to do easy and repetitive tasks while we could focus on more intricate and problematic tasks, which at the moment AI cannot complete effectively. We looked at multiple different AI programs and the tasks which ranged from generating images from one word, writing complete essays from scratch and even creating multiple different scenarios which could be applied to code.





After this talk, we had the opportunity to tour the BT Showcase and see the different projects that the BT team are working on. For example, a programme which could monitor individuals and items and possibly help save someone in case of a health emergency or a burglary if perhaps they were home alone. Or a 3D projector which could scan someone or something and project them in full 3D detail in a type of box which would cost £65,000 once fully developed. These were only two of the interesting projects that the BT team were working on.

After the tour we had a talk on AI economics and how it could one day be used to help businesses. We ended the day on an expoincluding many stands with different teams presenting an array of projects. Some of us participated in games of badminton, Splatoon and even experienced an electric shock on our ankles.



It was truly a day of fun filled with information that will ultimately help our class to understand what we would like to explore more in the IT world. We look forward to more fun trips to learn more about our subject and what opportunities are open to us.



Free School Meal Vouchers Christmas Break

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Christmas break 2023 has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible students will have received an email from Wonde to allow you to claim a voucher for £60 for this period. Please check your junk mail if you have not received this. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.

Sixth Form Boys' Football

The combined forces of Year 12 and 13 were back on display, this time away vs Shenfield in a recorded match for A Level assessment purposes. After a disappointing penalty loss in the last fixture the boys were motivated to come away victorious against a notoriously strong football school.

We lined up with Charters in goal and a back 4 of JT, Archie, Sam and Bendelow. Ahead of them, the two holding roles of Jacob and Jake allowed for the attacking trio of Gerrard, Micah



and Goodey to drive forwards or feed the solo striker of Harry. The boys started well, forcing saves and making strong tackles at the back. The high press we set forced the Shenfield keeper to rush a clearance as Harry Adams bore down on him to block the clearance which rebounded fortuitously into the SHS net. Goal scorer then became an assister, as Micah weaved past two and played a wide pass to Harry whose cutback was bundled home by Micah for our second.
