I read recently that when we look up in the daytime, we may observe clouds and sky, but apart from the sun, we see no further than the Kármán Line (where the earth's atmosphere ends and space begins) around 62 miles away. This got me thinking about how much further you can see at night.

According to what I have read, it is generally agreed that the furthest thing observable to the naked eye is Andromeda, a collection of a trillion stars lying 2.5 million light years away! One light year is about 6 trillion miles. It is pretty hard to imagine that distance – let alone 2.5 million times that distance!

I have been pondering this thought all through Advent.

It seems to have had a number of applications for us at Becket Keys.

Firstly, I know some families are going through some really difficult times. I know that, for some of you, Christmas is a particularly tough time – a dark time. I pray that in the dark and difficult times, families will be able to see the light of Christ even more clearly. Sixth Form – Courageous Advocacy



We are often asked to do an end of term review for the newsletter. This year I have decided to do something different.

When I was appointed to take on the role of Head of Sixth Form, I said from the outset that I wanted our Sixth Form students to be courageous advocates in all areas of school life. My first collective worship with both year groups addressed what this meant and how they could get involved. I am now excited to provide you with a little summary of what the Sixth Form has been up to this term. There will undoubtedly be some things that I miss, but I will try to share some key examples.

Firstly, we appointed all Year 12 students as prefects. This means that they serve the school by completing a small duty by assisting staff at lunch time. This gives the Sixth Form a lovely presence around the school and younger students feel reassured by their presence. Straight away some students took on extra duties and we have a team of prefects also welcoming students

as they arrive on the gate each morning.

A selection of students have offered their time in supporting lessons, and in one case delivering lessons with Mr Scott-Evans! One student who is looking to be a PE teacher has been shadowing lessons, helping with an extracurricular club and learning from our current trainee teachers. Mrs Noble has also been given a helper in some of her mathematics lessons.

We have numerous new clubs that have started or continued this term due to the leadership offered by Sixth Form students. We have speed cubing, Warhammer, the Lego First League, numerous sports clubs and music too! Some students decided to start a Gospel Choir and they have already performed at our Carol Service and are planning their next concert! During the recent Carol Service the Sixth Form students were superb in supporting the running of the event and giving their time to serve refreshments and help with the planning and organisation.

Our most popular request from students was to support in mentoring young students. Over 30 students attended a training course with Mr Shields and are now on our mentoring list. It is always exciting when Sixth Form students feel they can support

younger students – perhaps learning from their mistakes.

We have also been encouraging students to be courageous in seeking super curricular opportunities. We already have students who will be taking part in summer schools offered by Cambridge University such as the 'Think Like a Lawyer' programme. Others have secured exciting work experience places and have completed MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) and have broadened their knowledge by reading beyond the standard curriculum content. Students all have an Above and Beyond portfolio to complete so that they have a record of everything they do!



There are too many individual examples to share, and I do not want to miss anyone out. However, I am really excited for what the next term will bring! I hope we will see even more Sixth Form students supporting in lessons and delivering Collective Worship. I look forward to sharing more updates with you in future newsletters!

Sixth Form – Courageous Advocacy

Competence with percentages benefits our students' functioning in society. This term, Year 8 students have been learning about borrowing and investing money, interest rates, and depreciation, for example, what happens to the value of a car. Through paired work, students have discussed mathematical concepts applied to everyday life.

During one mathematics lesson, we transformed the classroom into a trading floor: The London Stock Exchange. Students were buzzing with excitement. They had £100 000 to invest in a choice of companies and there were a series of three events where stocks either went up or down. I wonder who had the most money at the end of the lesson?




In mathematics, we have learnt how to use multipliers, which is an efficient way of making percentage calculations. We have explored the difference between compound and simple interest and we have had to make informed decisions using interest rates to decide on the best bank to invest in. In some situations, I found that for a short term investment I would recommend simple interest, however for a long term investment I would recommend compound interest. Sometimes you cannot predict the future so when we played games we had a choice to lock some money away as a safety net. We learnt a lot about percentage increase and decrease.

Free School Meals



Free School Meal Vouchers Christmas Break

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Christmas break 2023 has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible students will have received an email from Wonde to allow you to claim a voucher for £60 for this period. Please check your junk mail if you have not received this. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.
