## Walking in Love

What a pleasure being with each year group at Becket Keys School this week and sharing the work of I GOT SHOES charity. On Valentine's Day, we asked students this question, "What does walking in love look like?" You see, Jesus modelled and lived a life of love. And if we, too, are to follow and live like he did, what would this look like today?

For us, it is travelling to Uganda and seeing first-hand the need for more children to access education. Not just feeling empathy but allowing compassion to move us to action. How powerful collaborating with groups like Becket Keys and making a difference together can be.

To date, Becket Keys has raised £1,787 for I GOT SHOES. Each non-uniform day, when students bring a £1 or £2 donation, it is one of the easiest ways to change the narrative for a student in Uganda. You might think, maybe, this sounds farfetched. Well, meet Rosemary.

Rosemary is one of our first graduates from the IGS vocational scholarship programme. She lives in a rural, impoverished community in Rakai District, Uganda. She was older when she sat her PLE (Primary Leaving Exams) and academically struggled. Yet, she desired to learn tailoring and one-day help contribute to the welfare of her family. We offered Rosemary a two-year tailoring programme which she recently completed.

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Excitingly, she has been hired by the vocational school to make uniforms for the other secondary students. For the first time in her life, she has her own room; she's earning income and is thriving.

Rosemary's story is very different from many girls in Uganda. The more we learn about girls and women in Uganda it continues to fuel our 'why'. Inequality and gender roles in traditional, maledominated societies are key barriers to girls receiving education. We shared these statistics with each year group:

"5 million Ugandan girls marry before the age of 18 and 1.3 million before the age of 15. Child marriage has a greater effect on girls living in rural and lowincome households, with families often deciding to collect a dowry rather than continue to pay for their daughters' education."

Quoted from UNICEF.

According to Save the Children, "1 million child marriages in Uganda could be prevented if girls get secondary education."

Perhaps as you reflect on this reality and ask yourself again, 'What does walking in love look like?' For us, we see students helping students. Students at Becket Keys helping change lives today across the world.




In the afternoon, students watched the full film of a famous Chinese animated movie with record-high box office.

Overall, it was a fantastic trip, and we look forward to any future exciting trips in the department!





## Nearly New Uniform Sale


Many thanks to all those who attending the sale last week we raised nearly £650 for the school funds.

Remember that we are happy to accept any donations throughout the year. Send them into reception with your son/daughter and we will rehome any items we can.




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## **Sports News**
