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
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with their children over the Easter break, allowing for deeper contemplation and discussion.

Student Achievement



Layla MacDonald (Year 11) and Josh Webb (Year 12) are both members of a local Karate Club Kazen Kai www.kazenkai.com and were both selected to compete in the England (EUKA) Karate team in the WKF Karate World Championships which was held in Malta from the 21st to the 25th of March.

The event was very well supported with competitors from as far afield as Brazil and the USA and large teams from Malta, Italy, Azerbaijan and Poland. The competition was fiercely contested especially in their individual 16-17 year old Sanborn fighting categories, where they both secured Bronze medals.

Our England EUKA team secured third place overall in the championship which was a fantastic result in the face of strong competition.





Ben Shelton in Year 12 took part in his first half marathon in Brentwood last week. Excellent result! Well done Ben.

Year 10 Trip - Ypres, Belgium

It was an early start for 44 Year 10s and 4 members of staff on Friday 22nd March.

With alarms set for 3am, the coach departed Becket Keys promptly with sleepy but excited Year 10 history students.
Our first stop was to pick up our tour guide for the trip, Mr Moray Treadwell who we soon learned (in addition to being a knowledgeable historian) was an actor in Pirates of the Caribbean – this was of great intrigue to the students... and we knew that his theatrical delivery would engage the students during the interesting day which laid ahead.



The traffic was extremely kind to us at that time in the morning and we managed to make an earlier ferry – saying Goodbye to the White Cliffs of Dover and Hello to France by breakfast time. We drove along the coast through Dunkirk and into Belgium, our first stop of the day was the LiJessebthoek CWGC Cemetery in Poperinge.





Moray explained to the students that during the war this had been the site of a casualty clearing station. He recalled the causes of the Great War, the role woman played during WW1 and then guided the students through the ethos of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, telling stories of individual soldiers and how their head stone showed all the information they could gather about their lives.



Our next stop was the Bayernwald trench system. We had a traditional French baguette lunch before the students got to walk through the labyrinth of trenches. They discovered about trench construction, trench warfare, daily routines and were able to bring to life how difficult conditions in the trenches would have been.





Back on the coach and onto the German War Cemetery of Langemark where 44,000 soldiers were buried. Here Moray reflected on the causes of WW2 with the students, discussing chemical warfare which had been used in this area and showed photos of Hilter in 1940 standing in the exact spot where we were standing.





The final educational stop of the afternoon was at the Hooge Crater Museum and Cemetery.
The students were able to handle

equipment and weaponry and one student even got to dress up in a Great War Uniform.





It was cold and raining by late afternoon, but we wanted to lay a wreath on behalf of Becket Keys at the memorial in the Cemetery. It was fitting to have a moment of reflection after all we had seen and learnt during the day.





Finally, a visit to Belgium would not be complete without chocolate shopping, so the last stop of the day was to the beautiful historical town of Ypres where purchases from the Peter De Groote chocolaterie was a special treat enjoyed by students and staff!



A smooth ferry crossing back and a clear run on the motorway had us back at Becket Keys by midnight. A jam packed 20 hour day, the students were tired but still in good spirits; they were a pleasure to take and a credit to Becket Keys.



The Radleys Matt Haig




Gangsta Granny David Walliams

- 2) All her life, she has been plotting to steal the Crown Jewels, and now she needs Ben's help...




Funky Chickens Benjamin Zephaniah




Enter the crazy world of rap poet Benjamin Zephaniah!



This will be Funny Someday Katie Henry



A collection of mathematical mistakes that result in disastrous or funny outcomes.






This month the Year 9s have been reading an excerpt from 'An Abundance of Katherines' in form time.

The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole aged 13 3/4 Sue Townsend




Meet Adrian Mole, a hapless teenager providing an unabashed, pimples-and-all glimpse into adolescent life.

Does My Head Look Big in This? Randa Abdel-Fattah




Don't panic - I'm Islamic!

We finished the term with the Sixth Form helpers handing out scores for parachute performance and creativity in their designs.


Next term we are looking forward to starting a Bronze Crest award. This is a student-led project in the STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics).
