Embracing The Power of Prayer

As we begin the journey through the summer term, I have been speaking to students in Collective Worship this week about the power of prayer and its significance here at Becket Keys Church of England School.

I shared a story with many year groups this week that I hope helped illustrate a particular theme of prayer. It's the tale of a man stranded on the roof of his house during a flood. Despite offers of assistance from neighbours in a boat and a rescue helicopter, he steadfastly insists on relying on praying, believing that God will provide salvation. Tragically, the man drowns in the floodwaters and, once in heaven, questions why God did not rescue

him. God's response is simple: He sent the boat and the helicopter!

I suggested to students this week that we must be devoted and consistent in prayer, and that we should look for how God is answering prayer rather than how we want prayers to be answered. As we navigate through various challenges and milestones this term, we will be praying for God's will to be done - not mine, not Dr Hurdle's and (sorry parents!) but neither yours nor your child's! God's will be done.

Over years of teaching, it is the summer term where I often see most students praying! Our students turn to prayer before exams; whether it be GCSEs, A Levels, or mock exams, students are taught that dedication and

diligence in study should be accompanied with devoted prayer. As we prepare for these occasions, let us offer prayers for creativity, teamwork, and joyful participation.

Moreover, let us extend our prayers to those within our community facing personal challenges. Whether it be health concerns, family issues, or other hardships, know that our thoughts and prayers are with you. Together, as a community united in faith and compassion, we can weather life's storms with

grace and resilience. We are pleased to hear that prayers are being answered for Mrs Cherry who hopefully will be able to return to work soon at least on a part time basis after her illness.



Finally, I'm pleased to announce the introduction of a new student prayer meeting, taking place on Tuesdays before school from 8am to 8:15am in the John Wraw Chapel in the Justin Welby Building. This dedicated time provides an opportunity for students to come together in prayer, reflection, and support. Brentwood can be tough to negotiate during rush hour, so we encourage students and parents to contact the school in the case of *genuine* lateness, such as delayed public transport.



Ski Trip 2024 — Sugarloaf Mountain

On a blustery Good Friday, the first day of the Easter holidays, 40 students and 5 staff gathered at school to set off on the school ski trip. There was much excitement as this was the first time since 2018 that the trip was running, and we were delighted to be returning to Sugarloaf Mountain again.



Sugarloaf is located in heart of Carrabassett Valley, which was carved by the Carrabassett River and is surrounded by Maine's Western Mountains. At 4,237 feet, Sugarloaf is the second tallest mountain in the state of Maine and has nearly 300 acres of developed trails and you can ski over 60 miles of trails including Tote Road which is 3.5 miles from summit to base and Timberline (a favourite of Mr Scott-Evans) which is an excellent run for first time skiers.





We arrived at the resort in the early hours of the morning (local time) and the students were happy to head straight off to their rooms to bed as we were going to be up early the next day to secure our ski equipment and meet our instructors.



The windy weather had followed us from the UK and so during the first day (Saturday) only one ski lift close to the nursery slopes was in operation along with the fabled resort 'moose caboose' which carried skiers back to the top of the slope. Although this was frustrating for some of the more experienced skiers it was a gentle introduction for the beginners and for those who had not skied in a long time.



Easter Sunday gave a small group the opportunity to rise at 5.00am to travel to the top of the mountain for the Easter Sunrise Service. This was service has been running for 62 years and is organised by the Sugarloaf Christian Ministry. The service was a wonderful way to praise God for the Resurrection of Jesus. Approximately 1,000 people joined the service and the beautiful sunrise took our breath away and it was wonderful to be amongst the first skiers on the mountain that day.

The weather was kind to us for the next few days and we were able to enjoy fabulous skiing conditions. The mountain looked beautiful, and our group was divided into ability levels so that they could experience the different trails suitable for their experience. During the week we practically had the resort to ourselves! It was so peaceful travelling on the chair lifts and the lack of crowds meant that our students could safely navigate the piste at their own pace.



Part of the fun of ski trips is the après ski activities and during the week staff and students enjoyed a movie night, watching the classic 'Cool Runnings', an evening at the local sports and leisure centre where we had the pool and hot tub to ourselves to enjoy. A night at the local bowling centre, we were able to stop at the local supermarket on the way to buy some American snacks and had a fun night with the Year 10 boys winning and Ewan in particular achieved a very high score.



On the last night, we had a quiz and awards evening where students won certificates for a range of categories including 'best technical skier', achieving 'big air' for a ski jump, 'person most likely to ski into a bench' and even 'the tidiest room'.





The weather had been so perfect all week we were slightly taken aback by the heavy snowfall overnight just before we were leaving.



It was lovely to watch the resort being covered in a white blanket and gave us some excellent photo opportunities just before we left.

Although the plane was delayed on the way back, we were delighted to get back to the school with no major injuries and return tired but happy students to their families. Here is what some of the students had to say:




Our School Library (Lib A)

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Why Apply?

The University of Kent has lots of experience running summer schools to introduce students to university life, to help them understand their options and make the choices about the next steps in their educational journey. We also want to give participants the chance to build skills to help them succeed. The Summer School provides the space and the support for participants to think deeply and to try new things, the chance to meet new people, to ask questions, and to express their opinions.

The Summer School is run on the University of Kent's Canterbury Campus. Students live in University accommodation for the duration of the residential.

What happens at a summer school?

This year's summer school will explore the theme of 'Breaking Barriers', encouraging participants to recognise barriers; personal, within their communities and in the wider world, and to re-imagine the ways in which we can support

each other to overcome them. Participants will explore how learning happens at university and have the opportunity to develop their own skills, alongside experiencing different aspects of student life, participating in sports and social activities and making new friends.



How much will it cost?

The summer school is free of charge, including accommodation, meals, all academic sessions and activities. Support with the cost
